Since taking part in the reality show 'Castaway' in 2000, Ben Fogle has become one of the nation's favourite presenters, with a passion for adventure and nature.

Considering Ben Fogle was a shy youngster, the TV presenter, writer, adventurer and documentary maker handles the spotlight remarkably well.

He grew up in London with his actress mother Julia Foster and Canadian father, vet Bruce Fogle, and two sisters. His mother starred in 1960s films like 'Alfie', alongside Michael Caine. Ben, now 51, would often dine at home with his mum's famous friends.

HOME AND AWAY

Ben puts his career down to a "mix of luck, opportunity and determination". His love of nature was fostered by annual summer trips to stay with his father's parents in Canada.

"Canada was my introduction to the great outdoors. I'd spend eight weeks canoeing and swimming and fishing, living the polar-opposite life to my urban existence in London," he has said. His life changed in 1999 after spotting an advert in 'The Guardian'. Out of 10,000 applicants, he became one of 36 volunteers to take part in the BBC's reality show 'Castaway'. Marooned on an island in the Outer Hebrides, their challenge was to form a self-sufficient community.

"I was in my mid-twenties, and it sounded like an amazing adventure," Ben recalled. "I learned a lot about myself and about our relationship with the landscape."

BRIEF ENCOUNTER

Ben met his wife Marina while dogwalking in Hyde Park. Theirs was a whirlwind romance and a marriage proposal came the day after Ben completed rowing 3,000 miles across the Atlantic with Olympic oarsman James Cracknell, which Ben calls his scariest experience. Marina's engagement ring was made from a small piece of rope — "I didn't have time to buy a ring," Ben wrote later in a social media post.

The couple, who married in 2006, have two children, daughter lona and son Ludovic. Sadly, their son Willem was stillborn in 2014.

Although renowned for his love of adventure and the wild, home is where Ben's heart lies. In 2019 he and Marina swapped life in London for a £2.2m rural retreat in Oxfordshire.

SOMETHING TO SHARE

In April, Ben completed a 24-date nationwide tour, 'Wild', which embraced everything he's been up to in the past 15 years, with an emphasis on his popular Channel 5 series, 'New Lives in the Wild', which he has been making since 2013. It sees him travel around the world visiting people who have given up the rat race. Episodes are available on www.channel5.com.

What's next for the man whose TV credits include 'Countryfile', which he's hosted for nine years, 'Extreme Dreams', 'Lost and Found', 'The One Show,' Animal Park' and 'The Great British Year'? "I want the next few decades to be about giving back: sharing things I've learned. I hope I can inspire people not necessarily to change their lives or move to the wilderness but perhaps to step out of their comfort zone."

How much does it really cost to buy a home?

When you buy a property, the purchase price is only the beginning. The additional fees can soon mount up. So what extra expenses might you face?

Property surveys

Mortgage lenders will carry out a basic valuation survey to confirm how much the property is worth. The price of this can start from around £150 but it can be free.

Three other types of survey are available: a RICS Home Survey Level 1, Level 2 (previously a Homebuyer Survey) and Level 3, which is a full structural survey.

Which one you choose will depend on the age and state of repair of the building. The basic Level 1 survey is only suitable for standard properties. The other two highlight potential problems and what is needed to put them right, with the structural survey going into greater detail.

The cost of these surveys can vary depending on location and property, but the most basic survey can set you back £500 or more, while a Level 3 survey is at least £700.

Mortgage arrangement fee

As well as a valuation survey fee, you will need to pay a mortgage arrangement fee, which is often more than £1,000. Lower fees tend to mean a higher interest rate. It's best to pay this fee in advance, to avoid paying interest on it throughout the term of your loan.

Conveyancing and solicitors' fees

Solicitors charge a fixed fee or a percentage of the value of the property. This could come to £1,500, with the costs of searches on top.

The searches most commonly used by homebuyers are local authority (up to £250), Land Registry (£4-£8), drainage and water (up to £100) and environmental (up to £60).

You'll also pay an electronic transfer fee of around £40 when your solicitor transfers the money electronically to your seller's solicitor.

Stamp Duty

Stamp Duty affects the purchasers of residential properties sold for over £125,000 (or £300,000 for first-time buyers). Rates are:

- £125,001 to £250,000: 2%
- £250,001 to £925,000: 5%
- £925,001 to £1.5 million: 10%
- Over £1.5 million: 12%

Removals

Removals firms generally charge from £400 but may charge more for weekend work.

Many people hire a van instead if they don't have many possessions. The cost of van hire varies according to where you live and the day you move.

Home insurance

Buildings insurance will be a requirement if you've taken out a mortgage. Contents insurance protects your belongings in the event of fire, flood, or other disaster.

Leasehold properties

If you buy a leasehold property, you'll need to pay a 'ground rent' each year, usually a nominal amount. Buying a flat within a block also attracts maintenance and service charges, which can increase annually.

What are the different types of life insurance?

Life insurance policies are designed to cover a particular scenario. These are just a couple of examples so let's look more closely at the common types of life insurance.

Term life insurance

It's the most common type of life insurance and lasts a set number of years, known as the 'term'. The most popular types of cover are:

Decreasing term life cover

You're most likely to buy decreasing term life insurance when you take out a mortgage, or another loan that you pay off over time. The policy lasts as long as your mortgage and the payout reduces in line with your mortgage as you pay it off.

Level term life cover

This is also a term cover product, but the payout doesn't reduce over time. You can choose how long you want the policy for and the level of cover which remains the same throughout the term.

Increasing term life

This one is a life insurance for a set period, but this time the payout increases during the term. The cost-of-living



increases over time (inflation) which means your money now won't go as far in the future as prices rise. With increasing term life insurance your payout increases in line with inflation but it does mean your premiums generally increase as well.

Joint life insurance

Joint life insurance covers you and a partner on one policy. It's sometimes cheaper than buying two policies and there's only one premium to pay each month.

It's worth bearing in mind that joint policies only pay the full cover amount once. After that, the policy will end and there'll be no cover for the surviving partner.

8 surprising facts about plants

1. You can buy young trees inoculated with truffle fungus

This means they can produce truffles when grown under optimum conditions. Many truffle species are edible and an expensive delicacy. Truffles are a type of mycorrhizal fungi, forming a symbiotic relationship with trees including hazel, oak, beech, silver birch and hornbeam. Growing wild in certain parts of the UK, truffles lurk beneath the soil like the very best hidden treasure!



Meanwhile, others become extinct. Highly endangered is the Western underground orchid, Rhizanthella gardneri, which shows no leaves or stems above the surface of the ground. One of the rarest plants is Encephalartos woodii. This South African native is a cycad species and only male specimens are known to exist.

3. A 'mast year' describes a bumper crop of fruit and nuts

This occurs naturally every five to ten years. One theory is it's a form of predator control. Animals such as squirrels, mice, badgers and birds eat the tree produce. During a 'mast year' they can't eat it all, ensuring that some seeds can germinate.

4. Oak trees need to mature before reproducing

English oak trees (Quercus robur) do not produce acorns until they are around 40 years old.

5. A banana is actually a berry

Strawberries are thought to be the only fruit to produce seeds on the outside. But these, together with raspberries and blackberries, are not berries but drupes ('stone' fruit). True berries include bananas, grapes, melons and oranges. They were named long before the precise definition was created.

In botanical terms, a berry has three layers: the outer skin, or exocarp, the fleshy interior, termed the mesocarp, and the inside layer which holds the multiple seeds, called the endocarp.

6. Sunflowers can be Teddy Bears

There are up to 70 species of sunflowers (HelianthusJ), including red and purple varieties as well as yellow. June is a great time to sow seeds directly into the ground but be wary of slugs. Not all sunflowers produce huge heads that track the sun. Some are more diminutive, including the 'Teddy Bear' variety which produces half pom-pom shaped flowers that are soft to the touch.

7. One plant can hide an elephant

Pennisetum purpureum is native to Africa and able to survive on uncultivated land where water levels and nutrients are sparse. It's known as elephant grass, because it can grow up to 4.5 metres tall and conceal an elephant.

8. You shouldn't drink cactus water

Despite tales of survival in a desert, it would be unwise to consume water stored inside a cactus leaf or stem. The liquid is extremely acidic and can damage human kidneys.

Outdoor living

Whether installed on balconies, patios or lawns, well-chosen furniture makes the garden fun and functional.

When you buy new garden furniture, you want it to enhance your garden and also be practical and durable. Choosing dining sets, sofas, lounge chairs and coffee tables is an investment, so it's good to ensure it lasts and lasts through rain, cold and

Are you able to store furniture

over the winter? If so, less sturdy options are a possibility (especially if they fold). However, most people have to keep large items outside, making it vital to consider what they're made from and how to look after them. So, before you sit back in the sun with a glass of something cold, consider the pros and cons of the four main materials used in making garden furniture.

METAL

Both cast and wrought iron can rust, and are usually protected with a painted or powder-coated finish. Clean and repaint it regularly, and it should last forever.

Steel furniture also needs to be sealed or painted, or left bare and galvanised. Stainless steel, on the other hand, should be more resistant to wear but be prepared to step in with rust remover if necessary. Cast aluminium is naturally rust-resistant but can corrode, so is best when painted.







Don't forget to store cushions away in bad weather.

TIMBER

All timber garden furniture wears naturally over time. The cheaper the wood, the less likely it is to last softwoods like pine and cedar, for example, need regular attention. Solid oak is naturally long lasting, provided regular after-care is carried out, while teak and eucalyptus contain natural oils that enhance their durability.

You may need to oil and/or stain timber furniture each year; it will certainly require a clean and, if painted, perhaps a touch-up. Don't paint hardwood, though - the oils will affect the paint.

WICKER

Natural rattan is beautiful but doesn't stand up to the British climate. It must also be stored over the winter. A popular choice is synthetic rattan, which can be woven onto a lightweight aluminium frame. **Ouality versions look and feel** natural but are completely weatherproof, needing just the occasional clean with soapy water.

PLASTIC

This can be a cheap option - but there are also more costly designer versions in sculptural shapes and cool colours, made from ecofriendly, recycled materials. Budget versions tend to be flimsy, while good-quality plastic is usually very weather resistant.

Don't dodge your doctor

Do you avoid your GP like the plague or know someone else who does? It's very common but early intervention is always best.

Nobody really enjoys going to the doctor about a health issue, but some people put off making that appointment at any cost. In fact, studies show that around a third of us suffer doctor avoidance syndrome. Men are the biggest culprits, with one survey finding that 65% of men said they'd delay seeking medical attention for as long as possible. Younger people tend to be doctor refuseniks too. often because they prefer to look online for medical information. Middle-aged folk, especially those with an unhealthy lifestyle, also have a tendency to steer clear.

Reasons to be fearful

Why do people avoid seeing their doctor?

- · Health anxiety. Worry about what the doctor might find.
- Embarrassment. Fear of discussion a problem with bowel habits, reproductive health or sexual
- Phobia. Some people fear needles, blood, pain, death or hospitals.
- Too busy. This is a classic male response.
- Men should man up. The idea that men shouldn't talk about their problems is still prevalent.
- Don't want to waste the doctor's time. A peculiarly British worry.
- · Can't get an appointment. Getting through to the surgery can sometimes be a struggle.
- It'll get better on its own. The outcome will usually be better if something is caught sooner.

How to help

It's not uncommon for A&E doctors to see patients whose condition has become serious because they've held off seeing their GP. In some cases – for example, cancer symptoms - visiting the doctor early is crucial. Remember, even if it's bad news, bad news early is good news! Here are some strategies to support someone who's resisting going to the doctor:

- · Say the right things. Guilt tripping and haranguing rarely work. It's better to explain how making an appointment can help than tell them what terrible things could happen if they don't. If they're nervous, reassure them it's ok to be anxious about a health issue.
- Offer to book an appointment. For someone who's busy or prone to delaying seeing the doctor, this is a practical way to help.
- · Go with them. If your friend or loved one is worried about going to the GP, offer to accompany them and sit in the waiting room while they have their consultation.
- Do something nice afterwards. Arranging a nice lunch or a walk afterwards might make the other person happier about going to the surgery.
- Lead by example. Look after your own health and always seek medical help promptly. It might rub off on a doctor-averse partner, friend or family member.
- Go to the pharmacist. Pharmacists can advise on all sorts of health issues - they may even persuade someone reluctant to see a GP to book an appointment.
- · Get help for a phobia. Cognitive behavioural therapy and other treatments may be beneficial.

focus on uerteventura

Blessed with year-round sunshine, gorgeous beaches and otherworldly landscapes - all just a four-hour flight from the UK - Fuerteventura is the second largest Canary Island. It goes a little under



the radar compared to its popular neighbours, Tenerife and Lanzarote, and moves at a slower pace. But don't be fooled into thinking there's no adventure to be had here. Here are a handful of the island's highlights.

Immerse yourself in Corralejo's surf culture

Corralejo is a bustling resort at the northernmost tip of the island. Once a quiet fishing village, it's now a popular beach resort with a beautiful marina and trendy shops, tapas bars and restaurants. The resort attracts a surfer crowd, so on a gusty day you can see swathes of surfers, windsurfers, kitesurfers and hydrofoilers taking to the waves. Join them by renting some equipment or taking lessons at one of the many surfing schools. Alternatively, lie back on the beach and watch.

Step back in time in Betancuria

If you're travelling through the middle of the island, be sure to stop in Betancuria. This pretty little town nestled in the mountains is where Spanish colonists built their capital in 1404. It's well preserved and an easy-to-follow trail tells you about the town's history. There's also a good handful of restaurants offering authentic Canarian food, making Betancuria a great lunch stop.

Explore the island's volcanic terrain

Swap flip-flops for hiking boots and you'll

be rewarded with some of the most striking scenery in the Canaries. The Ajuy caves were created by lava 100 million years ago. They can be accessed via a gentle walk along the black sand beach. A few



kilometres inland, the spectacular ravine of Barranco de Las Peñitas offers a more challenging hike. Climb to the famous Arco de las Peñitas for the best views. You might even encounter curious chipmunks!

Visit the uninhabited Isla de Lobos

A short ferry journey from Corralejo lies the nature reserve of Isla de Lobos. Walking trails criss-cross the island, offering the opportunity to spot native flora and breeding seabirds. There's also a pretty, sheltered bay that's perfect for taking a dip. The crystal-clear waters here are straight from a postcard, so bring a snorkel and search for sea life.

Make a beeline for the best beaches

There are loads of beaches to choose from, but some of the most picture-perfect stretches of sand can be found in Fuerteventura's Jandía peninsula in the south.



Cofete is a particular highlight; you can only reach this secluded beach via a bumpy dirt road, but your reward is more than 12 kilometres of unspoilt golden sand backed by dramatic mountains. This stunning landscape featured as a Star Wars film location.

BMW's rival to the Mercedes A-Class Saloon has been given a complete overhaul. Cameron Richards drives it.

What is it? With the introduction of a booted variant of its popular 1 Series hatchback, BMW addresses a need for a compact saloon within its range.

What's new? Its sloping roofline gives it a sleek look. The interior is minimalist with many controls integrated into the touchscreen system and the 'M Sport' trim level is standard across the range.

The 2 Series Gran Coupé is offered in a choice of drivetrains. More expensive models have adjustable dampers. These adjust the suspension according to the road surface.

What's under the bonnet? There are two engine options, with the cars badged '220' and 'M235'. For this test, we've driven the spicier M235 xDrive, which comes fitted with a 2.0-litre turbocharged petrol engine and four-wheel-drive. Its 304bhp and 400Nm of torque allow the car to hit 0-60mph in 4.7 seconds and reach 155mph (limited).

The '220' model comes with a 1.5-litre three-cylinder turbocharged petrol engine with 48V mild-hybrid technology, producing 172bhp.

A seven-speed automatic gearbox comes as standard.

What's it like to drive? The car is composed and controlled around the corners. The steering is nicely weighted and has a good feel. 'Sport' drive mode sharpens the throttle response. However, the gearbox is a little hesitant using the paddle shifts on the steering wheel. Our car's adjustable damping provides a smooth and comfortable ride.

How does it look? The A3's update is subtle. The new front end, while undeniably more modern looking, spoils the sharp, classy design of the outgoing car in our eyes. But the A3 is still a super stylish choice in the premium hatchback class.

How does it look? The sloping roofline is the main differentiation between the Gran Coupé and the 1 Series.

The rear tail lights follow the same design as the front lights. Our test car has a striking bright yellow paint job, while its two-tone diamond-cut alloy wheels and quad rear tailpipes give an aggressive look.

What's it like inside? There are lots of 'M Sport' references and the dashboard is finished off in the BMW Motorsport colours.

Build quality is superb, though there are a few harder plastics lower down in the cabin. While space in the back is compromised by the sloping roof line, legroom is good.

The M235 xDrive comes with 430 litres of boot space but the batteries for the mild-hybrid system on the 220 mean you only get 360 litres.

What's the spec like? Prices kick off at £34,915 for the entry-level 220 M Sport, which includes 18-inch alloy wheels, M Sport exterior styling and heated front seats.

Our M235 xDrive comes in at £44,435 and boasts equipment such as single zone air conditioning, sports seats and a gloss black boot spoiler.

Verdict If you want a fast, well-built and sporty coupé, the 2 Series Gran Coupé is one of the best compact executive saloons on the market.

Browned butter and almond summer fruit cake

This cake is the epitome of summer: it's sticky, jammy, fresh and not too sweet – and it's just dreamy with a dollop of crème fraîche on top!

Detail.

Serves 8 generously Preparation 30-35 minutes Cooking time 1 hour 15 minutes, plus cooling

You will need...

- 250g unsalted butter
- 370g icing sugar, sifted, plus extra for dusting
- · 200g ground almonds
- · 80g plain flour
- A pinch of sea salt
- 220g egg whites (save the yolks for tiramisu!)
- 3 tsp vanilla extract
- · 100g raspberries
- 1 ripe peach, sliced into half-moons (tinned also work well)
- Crème fraîche, to serve

Method..

- 1. Preheat the oven to 170°C, fan 150°C, gas mark 3. Grease and line a 21cm round tin.
- Melt the butter in a pan over a medium-high heat and continue to cook until it starts to brown, swirling the pan and keeping an eye on it so it doesn't turn from brown to burnt. Once the milk solids have gone a nutty brown, take the pan off the heat and leave to cool.
- 3. Whisk together the icing sugar, almonds, flour and salt in a large bowl.
- Add the egg whites and vanilla and stir until combined, then add the cooled brown butter and mix again.
- Pour the batter into the tin and put the tin in the fridge for 15 minutes until the batter has slightly firmed up.
- 6. Sprinkle the fruit on top, pressing the berries and peach slices halfway into the batter.
- Bake for 1 hour 15 minutes, covering loosely with foil after 50 minutes so it doesn't brown too much on top.
- Let the cake cool completely in the tin, then serve with a light dusting of icing sugar and a dollop of crème fraîche.




DON'T KNOW ONE END OF A SPADE FROM ANOTHER?
